
Sustainable Energy and Biodiversity Protection







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4. AN AWARENESS THAT MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Our energy is the **present of the future**.

4.1 ON THE PRESERVATION OF FORESTS

TERRA DE ESPERANÇA (LAND OF HOPE)



WE HAVE ALREADY BEGUN PLANTING THE FUTURE

Forests cover about 30% of the Earth's surface and are responsible for retaining 2/5 of all carbon stored in the planet's ecosystems. It is thanks to them and other vegetation that photosynthesis and the production of oxygen from carbon dioxide takes place. And that is why they are considered the "lungs of the world".

As such, we are aware that human life is intrinsically linked to the life of our forests, and that every time these green areas are destroyed or threatened, not only are several ecosystems harmed, but our own life as well.

In Portugal, the forest area corresponds to 3,182,000 hectares, more than 30% of the country's area, but in recent years the loss of green areas in wildfires has been significant. The Terra de Esperança (Land of Hope) Movement seeks to counteract this, investing in the reforestation of 500,000 trees that will certainly make a difference.

Launched in late 2017 by the Galp Foundation, in partnership with the National Association of Forest, Agriculture and Environment Companies (ANEFA) and Galp, the mission of the Terra de Esperança Movement is aimed at helping to reforest burnt areas and promoting the preservation of Portuguese forests, working together with municipalities and the community.

Together, we intent to plant 500,000 trees nationwide, having already mobilised more than 8,740 volunteers and 30 municipalities across the country.

In 2020, despite the fact that the COVID-19 pandemic made it impossible to carry out volunteer actions, 57 entities were still involved in the project, most of them municipalities, and continued their land reforestation programmes.

Overall, **479,458 trees have already been planted**, including cork oaks, strawberry trees, oaks, chestnut trees and other native species.

In 2021, the Terra de Esperança Movement will continue its **actions and mobilisation of communities towards our forests and their importance for global sustainability**, foreseeing the goal that was set will be met with even more partner municipalities.

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4.2 ON ACCESS TO SUSTAINABLE ENERGY

ENERGIZA



THE ENERGY THAT MOVES US

Mozambique is currently facing a major challenge in terms of access to energy. Out of a total population of about 29 million, approximately 16 million have no access to electricity¹, and nearly 70% live in rural areas.

It was in response to this context that we created Energiza, a project that is providing, for the first time, **renewable electricity to schools, health units and homes in several rural areas in Mozambique**. This project, which is being carried out in partnership with FUNAE (Mozambican Energy Fund), is also aimed at installing solar photovoltaic systems ("solar villages") in communities located in Cabo Delgado, Manica and Sofala.

In 2020, this project also addressed the repair and replacement of the mini-grids in Inhamuchindo, Chissinguane and Chivuli, which had been damaged by the IDAI cyclone in 2019.

Overall, **Energiza is changing the reality of many households and key services in Mozambique**, not only by providing them access to electricity as an essential good in their everyday life, but also because this energy comes from renewable sources, thus creating a positive impact on the sustainable, social and economic development of these and other communities.

The project is expected to end in 2021 with the completion of the infrastructures in Ninga, in the Cabo Delgado province, which was delayed, due to the context of social instability in that region.



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4.3 ON THE ENERGY TRANSITION

FUMUKABA



CLEANER ENERGY



"Put out the smoke." – the promise of Fumukaba.

As a result of low electricity production and the almost non-existent supply of butane gas, about 95% of the population living in Guinea-Bissau uses firewood and charcoal for cooking and other energy needs.

Given this reality, the Fumukaba project was created to promote the replacement of charcoal and firewood with butane gas, so that around **220,000 Guineans and over 25,000 households can cook their meals and perform other tasks with less impact to the environment.**

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As such, the project has also contributed on the improvement of food health in households and encouraged the creation of new commercial and small business opportunities by families, particularly women. In addition, it is estimated that, **within 10 years, Fumukaba could prevent the deforestation of an area equivalent to 100,000 hectares.**

This initiative was funded by the European Union and co-funded by the Galp Foundation, in partnership with the Union of Portuguese Speaking Capital Cities and the Municipality of Bissau, under the "Mayors Pact for Sub-Saharan Africa - Phase II" programme. Due to its impact and example in promoting energy transition, the Fumukaba Project was recognised in 2020 with an Energy Globe Award received from the Austrian Energy Globe Foundation.

This was certainly a big step not only for the social and economic development of the families and communities, but also for sustainable development, impacted by the promotion of this energy transition.

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4.4 ON THE EDUCATION OF YOUNGER GENERATIONS

FUTURE UP



EDUCATION IS THE BEGINNING OF A BETTER FUTURE

In the past 30 years, the world and the economy have been developing at a very fast pace, leading to great changes and improving the lives of millions of human beings. However, this progress also has negative consequences, including a 60% increase in CO₂ emissions.

In this context, the objectives for the coming decades are clear and imperative: continue to improve the lives of billions of people, by avoiding large-scale climate change and simultaneously reducing carbon emissions by at least 50%, while developing global energy systems so as to reduce energy needs by 7%.

This is an enormous challenge that is part of the reality of younger generations. With the help of technology and innovation, they will be the ones who will lead the **efforts to make society more aware of its global impact, changing its behaviours.**

It is therefore imperative to give these young people the opportunities to develop their talents and to play a decisive and active role in changing the communities they are part of. Future Up – the Galp Foundation's Educational Social Movement – is a project that seeks to do just that, in other words, give young people the **tools and opportunity to leverage change with ideas, solutions and sustainable products.**

Throughout each school year, in mentoring and experience-sharing programmes, Galp volunteers encourage students from primary school to university to develop their talents, solve problems, work as a team and use new digital and design thinking methodologies and tools. And through energy classes, where they address topics concerning the energy transition, renewable energy, sustainable mobility,

protection of natural resources or sustainable consumption, they challenge all of these students to **learn, act, teach and actively participate in the creation of ideas that can make our communities more sustainable.**

"Participating in these initiatives is very enriching, as we see kids getting organised to think about concrete problems and how to solve them, fostering their critical and entrepreneurial spirit. It makes us more humble.", said mentor Leonor Uva, Senior Manager of the Transformation area





In 2020, innovative solutions from all over Portugal were acknowledged. The Ribeiras School, in Matosinhos, was recognised for its maritime atelier aimed at studying sea-related issues; along with the Corgo School, in Vila Real, for the ecological house they planned to implement in their school.

At secondary school level, the team projects of students from Junior Achievement Portugal were recognised for the creation of biodegradable bags – Ecobags – for pet walks and the project of Colégio Marista de Carcavelos, in partnership with Tempus, for its ecological app that seeks to save paper and was designed by a team from Colégio Luso-Internacional, in Braga.

This acknowledgement culminated in an immersive programme at the Catholic University of Portugal, which is aimed at inspiring these pre-university students to implement their projects and become young social entrepreneurs.

Teenage visionaries: changing the world, one app at a time

Students from the Gondomar Secondary School, who participated in the 7th edition of Apps For Good Portugal, were awarded the Future Up Award – which distinguishes projects devoted to the preservation of resources, or projects that use renewable energy sources –, for their application (BOW - Based On Water), which can help families and any company to control the amount of water consumed, in order to save on their consumption and change their behaviours.

At the end of 2020, in the 3rd edition of Apps Start Up – an event included in the Portugal Digital Summit –, the Galp Foundation also distinguished students from the Dr. Serafim Leite School Group for the SandSpace and PoluMap projects, and from the Dr. Francisco Sanches School group, for the PooPet project, with awards for these technological solutions in the categories of sustainable energy and consumption, biodiversity protection and digital transformation. These three teams of students received merit scholarships that they can apply to their personal and academic development.

The belief that **education makes the world go round** is in the Galp Foundation's DNA, and, as such, we feel that it is necessary to continue to encourage young people, through their teachers, to continue their education.

Now more than ever, digital technology is playing a key role in the access to education and in obtaining a successful academic performance. **A computer is an essential tool for young students today**, not only because it allows them to follow school activities, but

also because it gives them access to information and methodologies to develop and extend their knowledge.

In Portugal, where the school dropout rate is still 8.9%¹, there are at least 300,000 students, according to the National Association of School Leaders, without a computer at home.

Realising this increasingly urgent need that was accentuated in 2020 due to the pandemic situation that forced classrooms to migrate exclusively to digital, the Galp Foundation joined its partners and came forward to **offer computers to young people and children**. The computers were delivered in Portugal, in coordination with the DGE (Directorate-General for Education), Student Keep and other social partners in Spain, Mozambique and São Tomé and Príncipe.

Also with a view to leveraging talent, in late 2020, the Galp Foundation joined the Cria-Te Movement (Create Yourself), launched by Galp and Rock in Rio, delivering computers to NGDOs working with children and young people at risk.

Cria-te was created to challenge the Portuguese people to create their tomorrow today. It is based on a digital platform that encourages each of us to share our stories, as well as gestures and moments from other people that changed our lives. This project promises to bring out the energy that everyone has within themselves to inspire others, and will continue to do so in 2021.

PROMOTING ACADEMIC SUCCESS AND THE IMPORTANCE OF VOLUNTEERING

In 2020, the education scheme has completely changed in Portugal and worldwide. **It became even more crucial to encourage these young people and children to continue their education.** Given this perspective, Galp Foundation, as a partner of EPIS, whose mission is to **promote academic success and social inclusion**, also adapted to the new reality and sought the best way to continue to help students, from a distance, with the same commitment in recent years.

In light of this, the Foundation donated computers to students without one, so that they could adapt to this new reality. This enabled us to maintain the connection between students and mentors. At home, through online systems and networks, such as Teams

or WhatsApp, these young people continued to receive tutoring from the volunteer mentors, who, even in this situation, were able to maintain the support they were providing to students and their academic path.

"Despite the absence of face-to-face communication, which is so important in this dynamic, we decided not to give up, and stay present."

Beatriz Forte, one of the mentors of the programme, tells us.

Our participation in the EPIS programme also included the awarding of 3 merit scholarships, for a 3-year cycle, to students from Matosinhos, Sines and Santiago do Cacém.

Knowing that **education is the most powerful energy to build the future of the coming generations**, the Galp Foundation developed an Education Support Scholarship Programme in Portugal, Spain, Mozambique and Eswatini, with the goal of **acknowledging the merit and talent of young students** in these countries.

This programme's main purpose is to support families and the education of their children, by awarding

scholarships that help to support the costs associated with the education of young people aged 11 to 18 and with good academic performance.

In Portugal and Spain, these scholarships cover school support for young students in primary and secondary education, as well as those entering university for the first time. In Eswatini, the scholarships are only for higher education students, while in Mozambique the programme will be launched during 2021 for university students.

In the case of higher education scholarships, the funding provided covers the total duration of the study cycle, in any of the geographies.

The criterion of merit and good academic performance that defines the awarding of these scholarships is another example of the Galp Foundation's efforts to **raise the quality of education for children who may, in the near future, be the key to changing many realities.**

Mozambique

With a population of approximately 29 million citizens, half of whom of school age, there are approximately 1.5 million Mozambican children who do not attend school.

Mozambique has one of the highest drop-out rates in the world, with only 24% of children aged 13-17 attending primary and secondary school. The long distances from home to school – 90% of the daily trips are made on foot and the distances can be up to 40 kilometres – and the lack of economic capacity to support the school costs, are some of the reasons behind this abandonment. In addition, Mozambican schools also face some deficiencies in terms of infrastructures, from poorly constructed classrooms to poor or even non-existent school desks.

Given all these difficulties, Galp Foundation, in partnership with Helpo, created Educate for the Future, an initiative that focuses on **aiding these children and young people with scholarships, school supplies and food**.

Additionally, in Nampula, in the community of Natoa, three classrooms are being built through the programme that will serve students from 1st to 9th grade, as well as a library that will provide them a space to do research, study and do their homework. With the help of its volunteers, the Galp Foundation filled the library with dictionaries, encyclopaedias, maps and other materials.

São Tomé and Príncipe

At the same time, in São Tomé and Príncipe, universal primary education has been achieved, but further efforts to improve the quality of education, increase the transition rate from primary to secondary school and support health and nutrition in pre-school remain indispensable.

In the Cantagalo district, mothers and children aged 0 to 5 who are malnourished or at risk of malnutrition are provided nutritional monitoring through PANMI – Programa de Acompanhamento Nutricional Materno Infantil (Mother-child Nutrition Monitoring Programme). **The support provided includes counselling, food and supplements** and all beneficiaries are monitored until the risk of malnutrition has been eliminated and their health is stable.

Educate for the Future is a programme that makes a difference in disadvantaged communities with greater difficulties, counteracting social inequalities and school drop-outs, **with access to education and opportunities for everyone to build a different future**.



In Mozambique, a woman's opportunity to pursue her studies or build a career is extremely limited.

Only 31% of the girls pass from primary to secondary school, with 40% of them having early pregnancies and 48% marrying prematurely. These data are the result of social and cultural pressures and the lack of resources of the contexts in which they live in¹.

Given this reality, the Galp Foundation joined Girl Move in defining and implementing the Believe and Lead programmes in Beira, in partnership with the University of Zambeze. These programmes are aimed at providing access to education and training for young Mozambican women, transforming them into the main agents of change in the awareness in their communities, thus seeking to leverage the talent of women towards economic and social development.

4.10 ON SUPPORT TO HUMANITARIAN CRISES

INTEGRATION OF DISPLACED COMMUNITIES



BRING HUMANITY BACK TO THE MOZAMBICAN COMMUNITIES

Northern Mozambique is currently experiencing a humanitarian crisis resulting from an armed conflict.

Hundreds of thousands of people are losing their homes, schools, work and food. Every day, villages are burned, people are killed and infrastructures are completely destroyed. A climate of fear is in place that triggers the need for people to flee to communities living in peace.

This is an increasingly emerging reality and, as such, the Galp Foundation, together with Helpo, redefined the investment plans and directed them to **aid Mozambican internally displaced persons**. Aid has been provided through **nutritional screening for pregnant women and children up to 2 years old** and by **sending survival kits** consisting of food, health and hygiene equipment and blankets.

Likewise, the Karibu project, supported by the Camões Institute, is creating conditions to integrate displaced persons from the Cabo Delgado region in the Mahate schools. In this context, several educational institutions will be adequately prepared and adapted to receive school-age internally displaced persons.

All these humanitarian actions will continue throughout 2021, with the promise of trying to give all these people and families in need a future with more social stability, basic conditions and general well-being.

The pandemic context we are currently living in reminds us every day that, in order to overcome obstacles, we need each other, and that **any gesture, small or large, can make a difference.**

This is precisely why the Galp Foundation and the Galp Group have joined forces in the fight against COVID-19 and implemented a set of **measures to support healthcare systems and to respond to the numerous social emergencies, with the goal of aiding those who need it most.**

Several initiatives were implemented on all Galp geographies, as a means of responding to the difficulties experienced in different communities in the country,

while promoting a campaign to gather volunteers – One gesture changes everything. Make yours. – to **mobilise Galp's personnel and the community to join various forms of volunteering, in person or remotely.**

In 2020, around 300 entities and/or social partners across 9 geographies were aided. In 2021, we are restating our commitment to continue providing all necessary support against the humanitarian crisis caused by the pandemic.



GOVERNANCE

The Galp Foundation is a private, non-profit foundation of social importance, established on 8 January 2009 under the Portuguese Civil Code, and in compliance with the provisions of the Framework Law on Foundations. It was founded by the following entities:

- Galp Energia, SGPS, S.A.
- Galp Exploração e Produção Petrolífera, S.A.
- Petrogal, S.A.
- Gás Natural, S.A.
- Galp Power, S.A.
- Galp Energia, S.A

On 22 July 2018, the Galp Foundation was granted public utility status for another five years. On the subject of institutional matters, it should be noted that the Galp Foundation has received multiple declarations of recognition of cultural importance for its various activities, issued on 23 October 2013 by the Secretary of State for Culture and on 30 December 2016 and 7 February 2018 by the Minister of Culture.

The Galp Foundation is a legally independent entity, with its own governance model, as defined in its regulations. However, it is linked to the organisational culture of the founding group with which it shares its name.

5.1 CODE OF ETHICS

The Galp Foundation operates primarily in the areas of energy and environment, education and culture and social development. In its Code of Ethics, approved and published in 2018, the Galp Foundation outlines the fundamental ethical guidelines that govern its operations, from a perspective of ethical commitments and conduct towards:

- (1) the people of the Foundation;
- (2) the wishes of its founders and other funders of the Foundation;
- (3) the Foundation's partners;
- (4) the Foundation's suppliers;
- (5) the beneficiaries of the Foundation's activity; and
- (6) society in general, both present and future.

The Code of Ethics states the importance of clearly defining the principles and responsibilities that the Galp Foundation recognises, accepts, shares and applies in its relations with its people and all other stakeholders in the Foundation's purposes, taking into account the specific nature of its institutional mission. For each of the situations listed therein, it sets out the commitments and responsibilities, but also, and no less importantly, how they are to be legally implemented.
